## First Parish Church, Derry

Originally constructed in 1769, the First Parish Church in Derry has undergone many changes throughout its nearly 250 year life span. One of the most interesting changes occurred in 1824, when the original frame was cut into two pieces, pulled apart, and two new bays were constructed between the building's ends. Now, as the building's 250th anniversary approaches, FPC is beginning another major rehabilitation. In 2015, the First Parish Church was awarded a \$125,000 LCHIP grant for work on the building's tower, including repairing the frame and the ornate belfry box. ## Smith Pond Shaker Forest, Enfield

The Smith Pond Shaker Forest consists of 995 acres of land situated between the NH Fish and Game's Laramie and Lower Shaker Wildlife Management Areas. Once part of the Shaker Village in Enfield, the property includes a scenic waterfall, 114 acres of wetlands, and an extensive shoreline on 63-acre Smith Pond. Historic stonework, dams, chases, and canals lead down from Smith Pond which was once the Village water supply. In 2015 LCHIP awarded the Upper Valley Land Trust (UVLT) \$325,000 to assist with the acquisition of the property which, with the state lands, will create an unfragmented forest block of over 5,000 acres. UVLT will manage the property as a community forest, partnering with the Shaker Museum to provide interpretive displays. [More here](#).



## Bodwell Farm, Kensington

Thanks to its lush pastures, productive farmland and wise management, the Bodwell Farm in Kensington has produced a steady supply of milk and dairy products for six generations. The farm is one of only six commercial dairies remaining in Rockingham County and a drive down Stumpfield Road offers a window into New Hampshire's agrarian past. Built around an historic farmhouse (circa 1750), the farming operation focuses on milking 200+ grass-fed Holsteins whose milk is sold to a regional farmer's cooperative that

supplies Cabot Creamery. The Southeast Land Trust will use a \$100,000 LCHIP grant awarded in 2015 to help ensure this farmland remains available for food production, wildlife habitat, and community recreation. [More here.](#)


